

SINGLED OUT: OREGON COLLEGES

BUILDING A COLLEGE LIST

Audience

10th – 11th grade students

Time

45– 60 minutes

Materials needed

- Instructions & discussion tips (p. 1-3)
- College preference cards (p. 4-8) print single sided
- Oregon college information cards (p. 9-84) print double sided
- Computer or tablet for each student

Purpose

Demonstrates how a college search engine helps narrow a large group of colleges into a manageable list of potential options. Following the group activity, students will use a search engine to develop a college list to research further.

Instructions

Before starting the simulation, lead a brief discussion on the factors students consider when deciding which colleges to learn more about. There is no need to go into great detail at this point—that will come as the activity moves along. Ask just a few questions:

- 1) What are the first things you think about when someone asks what you like about colleges?
- 2) Think about when you have visited a college campus. What did you see or learn that you liked?
What didn't you like?
- 3) What are the most important things to you in choosing a college?

Choose 1 volunteer to be the Picker. Choose 37 volunteers to be the College Pool.

If you have fewer than 38 students, you can reduce the number of cards in your pool or give multiple cards to each student.

- Give the preference cards to the Picker. Ask them to look through the cards and put them in order of importance to them. For example, if location is most important to them, they should put that card on top.
- Randomly hand out one college card to each member of the College Pool. Ask them to stand in a group facing the audience and to hold the card so the group can see the name of the college, and the volunteer can see the characteristics.



The premise

Have you ever heard someone equate the college search process with dating and marriage? Students “meet” several colleges, discover what they like or don’t like, and ultimately commit to one. One of the first steps in both the college search and dating is to narrow the pool of potential options.

Singled Out is a dating show that first aired on MTV from 1995 to 1998 and was revived in 2018. In the show a blindfolded “picker” chooses a partner from the “dating pool” of 50 potential suitors. In the first round of play, they are presented with a set of possible categories, for which 2-3 choices are listed. When the Picker eliminates one of the choices, all members of the Dating Pool who fit that choice are also eliminated. The elimination continues until just 5-8 members of the Dating Pool remain.

It's just like a college search engine! Those start with the 4000+ colleges in the US, ask students to identify characteristics that matter to them, and narrow the pool of colleges to a more manageable number.

This activity uses the *Singled Out* gameplay to simulate a college search engine in an in-person, interactive opportunity to experience how a search engine uses students’ interests to sift through thousands of colleges and produce a manageable list to research further.

The play

- 1) The Picker reads the bolded question on their first preference card and states which choice(s) they prefer. They can select to keep 1, 2 or all of the choices. Remind them that making some choices is important because their goal is to find colleges that will be a good fit for them. Doing so requires having some ideas about what type of environment or experience they want.
- 2) After the Picker states their preference, the members of the College Pool review the information on the back of their cards. If their college does not meet the Picker’s preference, they are eliminated and should sit down or leave the stage.
- 3) Continue play until 6-10 colleges remain in the pool. If one preference card eliminates so many colleges that fewer than 6 remain, ask the Picker if they are flexible about that preference. If so, invite the last group of eliminated colleges to return to the pool. The Picker then moves on to the next preference card.
- 4) When the College Pool has been narrowed to 6-10, ask the members of the pool to read their fun fact. For each college, the Picker decides if they like the fun fact or not. If they do, the college remains in the pool. If they do not, the college is eliminated.
- 5) The final remaining colleges are the Picker’s college list.
- 6) Repeat play with a new Picker to show that different preferences result in different final lists.



Discussion tips

As the game concludes, students will notice that the Picker did not have an opportunity to select all of the things that might be important to a student when researching colleges. Ask students for examples of other characteristics that are important to them.

Answers may vary and all are valid. Be sure, though, that things like academic programs and cost are on the list.

Following discussion, students will use a search engine to create a list of colleges they want to research further.

Extension option

The college cards do not include for-profit trade schools or out-of-state colleges and universities.

1. Encourage students to brainstorm a list of additional trade schools, colleges and universities.
2. Provide copies of the included blank template for students to complete.
3. Play the game again with these new cards, increasing or decreasing the number of volunteers for the pool as needed.

Preference Cards

Fraternities and sororities are sometimes called the “Greek system.” They are social organizations formed around common goals and aspirations, and students who participate in them make a lifetime commitment to the group. Some colleges have these student groups, and some do not. No one is required to join. Do you want to join a fraternity or sorority in college?

- I would like to be a member of a fraternity or sorority
- I would not like to be in a fraternity or sorority

Choose your option.
